

HOLLYWOOD DIRECTORS, FOREVER DRAWN TO SOUTHERN CALIFORNIA'S GOLDEN GLOW, ARE NOT THE ONLY ONES WHO KNOW HOW

to gild with light. Los Angeles-based interior designers Daniel C. Cuevas and Carole Katleman are equally adept, as seen in their light-infused renovation of a young couple's 15,000-square-foot home in Holmby Hills, an enclave where the neighbors include familiar faces from the movies. Indeed, when the couple first invited Cuevas and Katleman to view the property, the designers instantly recognized it as the site of actress Candice Bergen's childhood home, rebuilt by later owners in the 1980s. Arriving after those changes, the couple had several major goals in mind. They wanted to brighten the house, allowing in more natural light, and to enhance a comfortable indoor-outdoor lifestyle. They also wanted to illuminate an eclectic and important art collection—without introducing so much sunshine that it would harm either a monumental seventeenth-century French tapestry or contemporary works by the likes of David Hockney, Mark di Suvero and Richard Serra.

Cuevas and Katleman, independent designers who collaborate on projects from time to time and had previously worked together with these clients, pursued multiple solutions. "We designed and installed a coffered ceiling in the large living room and added six skylights. This brought in direct sunlight, of course," says Cuevas. "In the dining room on both sides of a fireplace, we added tall French doors. They not only let in more light but give the couple a view of the rose garden and lead outdoors to an alfresco dining patio." The

designers also created a sunny conservatory to connect the parents' master bedroom to their children's rooms.

The look is clean but comfortable. "Rather than using heavy dramatic draperies," Katleman says, "we opted for simple Roman shades or no curtains at all. To showcase the art, we decided on a warm white for the interior walls and installed more recessed lighting. We also lightened the wood floors and wall paneling. Overall, we struck a balance between the natural light of Los Angeles and artificial light while respecting the formality and elegance of the architecture."

Cuevas, who is a partner in Dennis & Leen and the Formations lines of furnishings and accessories, says he and Katleman chose a pale palette of silk, linen, velvet and corduroy fabrics, favoring texture over pattern. Even the furniture enhances the art, as seen in the custom eighteen-foot-long banquette beneath the tapestry.

Indoor and outdoor activities also flow easily. "We connected the living room to the pool with landscaping and a cascade of steps," says Cuevas. Adds Katleman, "The home reflects the owners' desired lifestyle."
